## Veterans Return to Sea — In a Mission to Protect It

### **Honolulu, Hawaii / Houma, Louisiana**

In a historic shift from defense to preservation, retired United States Navy veterans living in Hawaii are being invited to return to the sea — not for combat, but for conservation, innovation, and international hospitality leadership.

The USA–UAE Coral Civilization Initiative, led by Planet Ocean Underwater Hotels, introduces the world’s first movable US Patent Design underwater hotel platform — and with it, a new maritime command opportunity structured around the leadership principles of the U.S. Navy.

Each underwater hotel operates with:

- 18 primary crew members
- A structured rotational relief crew
- Triple-redundancy life-support systems
- 24/7 marine operations oversight
- Employee-owned fabrication and operational management

The fabrication begins in Houma and Morgan City, Louisiana — communities deeply rooted in American maritime steel construction. Operations and Pacific training command will be based in Hawaii.

For retired Navy veterans, especially those residing in Hawaii, the opportunity represents something rare: a return to sea under a disciplined rotational command structure — but this time in a civilian hospitality and ocean restoration mission.

Tony Webb, founder of Planet Ocean Underwater Hotels and a former U.S. Navy serviceman specialized in celestial navigation, attended Admiral Farragut Academy in St. Petersburg, Florida. He states:

“The command structure, safety doctrine, and rotational discipline that built our Navy can now be applied to something equally important — protecting and restoring the ocean while welcoming the world to experience it safely.”

The initiative pairs 50 U.S. states with 50 nations in an economic and marine restoration alliance. A portion of operational net profits (16.5%) is dedicated to coral reef restoration, while the remaining structure supports employee-owned teams and Global Alliance Collaborators.

What makes this story unique is not only the technology — a movable, non-permanent seabed platform — but the cultural shift: veterans trained for maritime precision returning to sea to lead a new era of environmental and hospitality innovation.

For many retired service members, this represents more than employment. It represents mission continuity.

America may soon witness something rarely seen in modern times: seasoned naval professionals once again standing watch — beneath the ocean surface — in a peaceful and cooperative global venture.
